### **Priorities of the 2019/20 IEC:**

1. Access
  - Reduce barriers to global education experience
  - Support mission, reach and participation of sub-committees.
2. Competency Building
  - Develop tools to support faculty integration of international learning into their teaching, even during COVID19;
  - Develop platform for sharing best practices across disciplines
  - Support student to student mentoring on international educational experiences.
3. Expansion
  - Foster development of internationalfaculty partnerships;
  - Continue to increase the number of SULBstudents engaging in international educational experiences.
4. Growth
  - Formalize the IECcollaboration system with Global Studies Institute (GSI). Faculty Center, C PIE, Professors Around the World (PAW) Awardees as Mentors, and the Colleges
  - Continue to communicate PAW opportunities, as applications continue to increase
  - Elevate Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL) working group to an IECSubcommittee.
  - Review and approvenew exchange partners andservice providers.
5. Transparency
  - Develop standard recommendationsfor sub-committee reporting and membership

## Future Development:

1. Address Disruption – Work closely with CIE and CPI to support both international and native students as they work to achieve their international education goals.
2. Collaborate – Work closely with the Faculty Center as the first point-of-contact for faculty searching for resources to build international education into their teaching.
3. Support Innovation – Assist in the development of a web-portal to support faculty as they develop course content expanding student access to Online International Learning (COIL). Provide course and collaborative project examples, workshops, speakers and demonstrations as resources while developing a COIL playbook in collaboration with Academic Technology Services (ATS).
4. Provide Guidance – To support new GEGR policy, develop recommendations for linking global learning to national standards.
5. Expand Access and Reach – Facilitate the integration of global competencies across majors, thereby taking an inclusive and interdisciplinary approach to introducing students (without the ability to travel) to the wide range of opportunities and skills needed to be successful in a diverse global world.
6. Remove Barriers to Engagement - Support IEC Subcommittee's work to build membership and communicate across the University.

## Summary:

As an Academic Senate committee consisting of administrators, faculty, and staff representing the Colleges and Units of the University, the IEC convenes to bring insight into the diverse opportunities and challenges associated with International Education. IEC members, as ambassadors for international education within their colleges and units, promote events (such as the Study Abroad Fair to students) and share opportunities with faculty (such as PAW Grants, Florence Semester and London Semester teaching programs). The IEC is adapting to new and diverse demands due to the conditions of COVID19.

IEC members contribute many hours of service by volunteering to review hundreds of applications for scholarships and grants from both students and faculty. This work contributes to self-governance and transparency through sharing feedback-driven evolution of standards for evaluating applications and recommending awards.
